



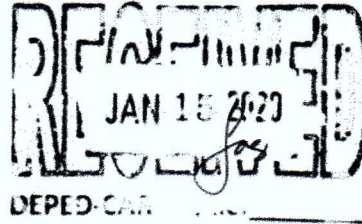


Dear Director Eclar:




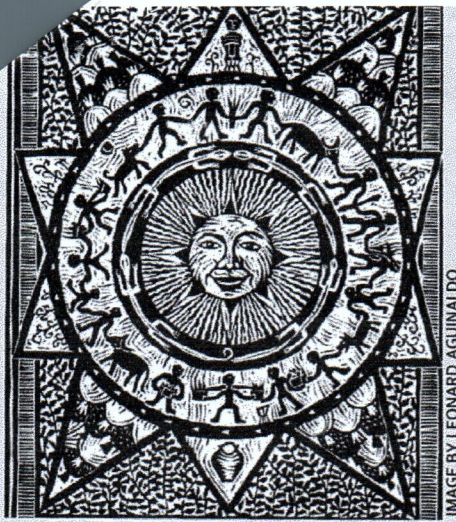
